MAY CELEBRATIONS

EASTER SEASON

Remember, we are in the Easter Season until Pentecost, which is May 15th. The *Little White Book* has information about the Easter Season, traditions, customs, historical facts and saints on the left-hand page. Because the weekday Gospels include the Bread of Life discourse and the Last Supper discourse, many left-hand pages contain information about Communion.

The right-hand page looks at the Gospel passages for the weekday Masses, and some reflections.

ASCENSION

We celebrate Jesus' ascension into Heaven 40 days after Easter. This year the Ascension of Our Lord, a holy day of obligation, falls on Thursday, May 5th. In the San Francisco Archdiocese, it is celebrated on Sunday, May 8th.

"Let me think about Jesus.

Nobody knew who he was for almost 30 years of his life. Then he came down to Judea and listened to John the Baptist. One day he stepped into the river and the Spirit came upon him like a dove. From then on, everything was different. He stepped out of that river and became the preacher, healer, wonder-worker known all around.

Let me think about Mary.

She was a teenage peasant girl in a hick town. One day the Spirit came upon her and her whole life changed.

And what about the disciples?

They were frightened, paralyzed by fear. They were huddled in the Upper Room behind locked doors. Then Jesus appeared to them and breathed the Spirit upon them, and well, I know the rest of the story.

Whenever the Spirit comes upon people in the Gospels, they suddenly come alive in a new way.

And the same is true for me."

MAY, THE MONTH OF MARY

We honor Mary, the Mother of God, during the month of May. She is our example of faith because she lived her life by faith. Mary is the model for the Marists' way of life.

"Mary of Nazareth, the first disciple of the Lord and Mother of the Church, is the heart of our identity as Marists. This remarkable woman of faith has called us to this way of life. We believe that we have been called by a 'gracious choice' into the family of Mary. It is her work that we do and so we commit ourselves to think, judge, feel and act as she did." (from the Statement of Identity, US Province of the Marists Assembly and Chapter of June 2013)

On Friday, May 13th, we will honor Mary at our 8:45 a.m. School Mass in the Church. Each student is asked to bring one flower to make a class bouquet to be brought up at the beginning of Mass when the first grade will crown Mary.

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

The sixty-fourth National Day of Prayer is Thursday, May 5th. The National Day of Prayer is an annual observance held on the first Thursday of May, inviting people of all faiths to pray for the nation. It was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of the United States Congress, and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman.

The theme for 2016 is **Wake Up America**, emphasizing the need for individuals, corporately and individually, to return to the God of our Fathers in reverence for His Holy Name. To further highlight the theme, Isaiah 58:1a has been chosen as the Scripture for this year: "Shout it aloud, do not hold back. Raise your voice like a trumpet."

May 31 – The Visitation – When Mary learned that her cousin Elizabeth was also expecting a child, she walked many miles to visit her.

The CSJ MISSION is Taller San Jose. The Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange opened Taller San Jose in 1995 in response to

the prevalence of crime and gang violence in Santa Ana. Taller San Jose (St. Joseph's Workshop) is a highly focused, goal-oriented program that targets young adults, ages 18-28, who are caught in a cycle of crime and poverty and need marketable job skills in order to become productive self-reliant adults. It focuses on young people who have dropped out of high school, have been incarcerated or are on probation, and have a background of gang involvement. One of the MARIST MISSION projects we support is in the Diocese of Rarotonga in Fiji. They have rebuilt and refurbished St. Joseph's School which had been built of surplus World War II building materials that contained a lot of asbestos. Our monies helped with the rebuilding and presently funds are used for equipment, textbooks and supplies.
